As we turn the page on a new year, the words of the Christmas holiday season are worth spending time for reflection.

For many people, this Advent Season was not ripe with calm and bright. Bad things have happened to good people. Family members, friends, neighbors and acquaintances have suffered the effects of COVID. Others feel heavy burdens to carry as they, or a dearly loved one, suffer pains caused by illness, separation, or economic changes. On a larger scale, our neighbors in Kentucky and several other states continue to suffer ravages of devastating tornadoes. Typhoons ravaged friends and family in the Philippines. I could go on, but trust you understand the point.

And yet, here we are in the New Year, renewed by the commemoration of Mary's "yes", and the birth of the Savior. 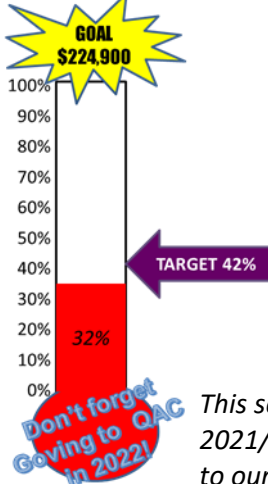
Our Volunteers Are Valuable

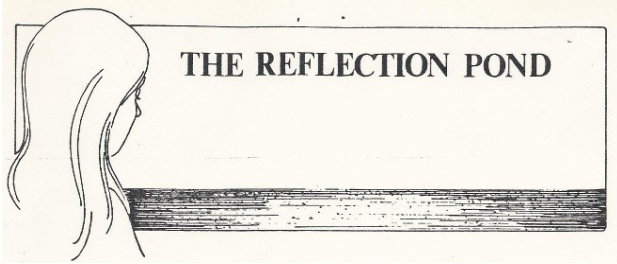

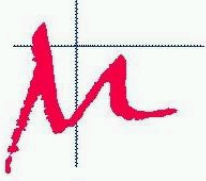

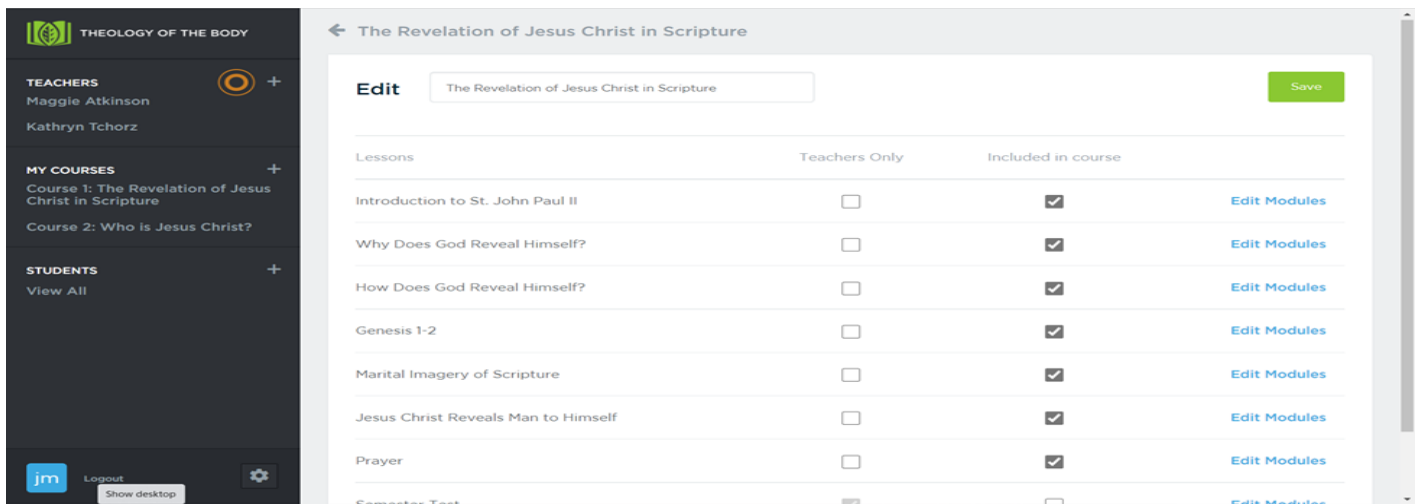

The Marianist high schoolers

As part of this year's Religious education program, youth who are already confirmed are part of a class called the Marianist high schoolers. This class combines sessions of catechetical formation and L.I.F.E student-led classes. The catechetical formation we chose for our students this year is based on the digital program from RUAH WOODS and is titled CALLED TO BE MORE. This curriculum presents the teachings of Saint John Paul II on theology of the body. We have four students this year and we pray that God touches their hearts and minds personally through RE sessions. Our catechists for this year are Maggie Atkinson and Kathryn Tchorz, and I would like to acknowledge them and thank them personally not just for volunteering but for who they are being to our youth. I really hope they know the impact that they are making and it only suffices to look at the world around our kids today to understand the spiritual price at stake. Maggie and Kathryn have surprised me with their motherly generosity, with an abundance of desire for the faith and with a personal deep longing for God that really poured out to their students. We really should be thankful that God's hand is everywhere, and his Holy Spirit really is working in our community and in our kids' lives. He is the faithful one and his promises of spiritual providence never fail, even when we slack or become weary.

Why CALLED TO BE MORE?

As I mentioned, the CALLED TO BE MORE curriculum from Ruah Woods is a curriculum presented on a digital platform where students can register, as well as parents, to have access to the lessons and other resources. Parents have been encouraged every week to discuss with their kids what they have been learning in class by accessing the platform. This is part of the weekly parent faith formation since building the domestic church is an important aspect of RE this year. A screenshot of the platform is below and shows how interactive this could be between teachers, DRE, parents and students. The opportunities of engagement exceed that of a typical textbook with resources such as testimonial videos and built-in discussions and reflections etc.

But the main and true richness of the program and the reason behind the choice is of course the content itself. CALLED TO BE MORE is not another light presentation of the theology of the body that kids “could understand”, and it is not just a focus on the implications of the great Pope’s teachings in terms of the dos and the don’ts. This curriculum is not so much concerned with what the consequences of the secular views have been on our kids, but is concerned with what we are not teaching our kids about the truth and the purpose of who they are. By teaching IN DEPTH the “whys” of the Catholic church, we can build in our kids a strong and internal moral compass that the love of God can permanently nurture. I do specify IN DEPTH because one of the main incentives behind the curriculum is to stop watering down the faith for our youth so that their religion can fit into a world that is constantly telling them that the neutral, relative and “tolerant” view of YOU DO YOU and I DO ME is what makes them happy and free. What will make them happy is to have their desires and their aspirations aligned with what they were created for, aligned with the objective truth that God is and that Jesus, by becoming a man has revealed. In reference to course 1, we hope to communicate the following:

- Jesus Christ reveals to us that we are inherently relational. A statement such as “I can cheat on my test if I want to. It is not going to hurt anyone” is simply and inherently unsound and goes against how our souls work.
- Jesus Christ reveals to us as well, by revealing the Holy Trinity, that we are loved. In His supreme gift of self on the cross, Jesus shows us this tremendous love that allows us to exist. Man cannot live without love since he remains incomprehensible for himself.
- By revealing God’s love through giving all on the cross, Jesus also reveals that our suffering has meaning. God was able to use even suffering to love, to redeem, to offer mercy. This also reminds us that God can bring good out of everything, even our suffering.
- Finally, by becoming man, Jesus reveals that our bodies have meaning and that they are good. If our bodies were a hindrance to love, Jesus would have never become man.

Through this curriculum, we are trying to awaken the hearts and minds of our youth at QAC, to the incredible dignity of the human person. The idea of atheistic humanism, in which God is seen as an illusion — a chain to which some narrow minded or unsophisticated people have fastened themselves, cannot compare with the greatness of the human person revealed by Jesus Christ.

Please keep our youth in your prayers. They are just starting on the battlefield, and they are already tired of the confused, inwardly driven and unfulfilling world that keeps failing them. Let us renew our responsibility, as the body of Christ, and through our Mother Church, to be here to point them to Jesus and the peace that He has for them.

Seniors' Corner

January 2022 - Happy New Year

And the New Year is looking better already. The days are getting longer - not by much, just a couple minutes a day, but by mid-June in Dayton, the day will be lengthened by over 5 and a half hours. A piece of Trivia: On the Arctic Circle the days length will increase by 24 hours. I remember this information, with the help of the internet, and my Jr. High Earth Sciences class.

Last November, I went to the Wright State School of Music website and made a list of the Fall recitals and concerts and posted it on my boards. When Wright State reopens in January, I will develop similar information for the Winter/Spring 2022 Semester. Sad to say I did not attend any of their Fall recitals.

Ruby and I generally go out at least once a month on an old-fashioned Sunday Drive. The two for December were to observe the Christmas Lights. This year we included at Caesar Ford Greene County Park, east of Xenia. It has over a mile long twisting path through the park with many seasonal electric displays. The volunteers and county put a lot of work and imagination in the effects. Thank You.

My discussion is jumping all over the place. Now I am now going to talk about one of my favorite subjects besides fishing - FOOD. There is an old platitude: Eat breakfast like a king, lunch like a prince and supper like a pauper. Since I only really have two meals a day, I observe the first two. For breakfast, I usually plan ahead and have several different comfort foods - easily available options. Every breakfast includes al-dente, no sweetener added, pan cooked apples. I make them up in a 3 to 4lb batch. This generally lasts about a week. One comfort food option is 100% oatmeal (old fashion oats) waffles. I use a blender in 3 cup batches to powderize the oatmeal, then add 3 eggs, 1 cup of milk, 1/4 cup olive oil plus sugar and leavening. I always make a double batch ~ 12/13 8-inch round waffles. To store, I use wax paper between each waffle and place 6 in a one gallon zip-top bag to freeze. The waffles have a mild nutty/buckwheat flavor. I tried to make pancakes once but because oatmeal has no gluten, the pancakes were very crumbly. I also tried 100% oatmeal scones, they were very very crumbly. Another comfort food option is homemade 95% lean country pork sausage, milk gravy over biscuits - 1lb of sausage, 4 cups of milk, a tube of biscuits makes 6 generous servings.

In closing, I hope everyone had a very joyous Christmas and will have a very Blessed New Year! *Thinking of You All: Chuck*

The Holy Father, in seeking to hear from all the People of God on how to better bring the Mission of the Church to the world, has announced Synod 2021-2023. To start, he is asking for all dioceses throughout the world to conduct local meetings to discuss this very topic.

Who are the People of God? It is all the baptized. That means not only the lay faithful, those in religious orders, and the clergy. It also means those who are poor, disabled, migrants and immigrants, elderly, young adults, those who no longer practice the faith, women and men. In other words, everyone.

Did you know that when you were baptized you were called to a priestly, prophetic, and kingly mission to bring the good news to all? This duty then does not lie strictly with the clergy. The Holy Spirit dwells within God's people. The Holy Father recognizes that coming together to discuss how to better further the mission of the Church is where the Holy Spirit can work powerfully.

The 10 themes of the Synod that will be discussed:

- **Companions:** In our local Church, who are those who “walk together”?
- **Listening:** How is God speaking to us through voices we sometimes ignore?
- **Speaking Out:** What enables or hinders speaking up courageously, candidly, civilly, and responsibly in our local Church and in society?
- **Celebration:** How do prayer and liturgical celebrations actually inspire and guide our common life and mission in our community?

- **Sharing Responsibility:** As missionary disciples, how is every baptized person called to participate in the mission of the Church?
- **Dialogue:** To what extent do diverse peoples in our community come together for dialogue?
- **Ecumenism:** What relationships does our Church community have with members of other Christian traditions and denominations?
- **Participation:** How does our Church community identify the goals to be pursued, the way to reach them, and the steps to be taken?
- **Discerning:** What methods and processes do we use in decision-making?
- **Forming Ourselves:** How does our church community form people to be more capable of “walking together,” listening to one another, participating in mission, and engaging in dialogue?
