Over the past month, we received 43 responses to the survey for feedback on forming a new Marianist Lay Community. Thank you!

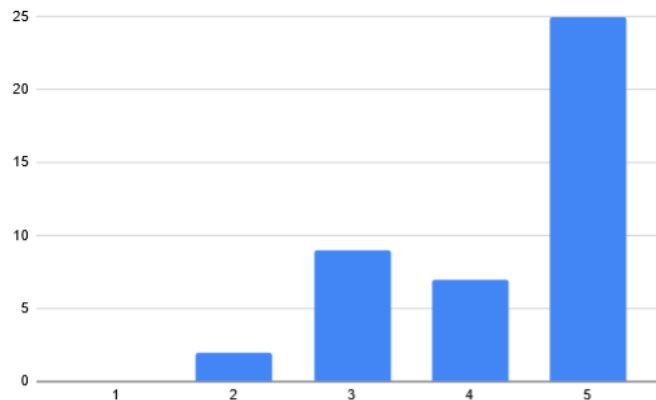
In the survey, we asked four questions:

- Is there anything else you'd like to share or clarify?

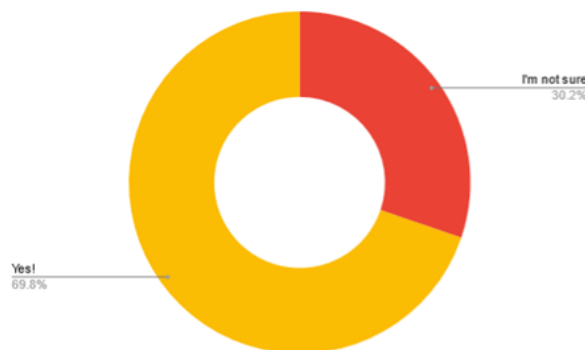


The Naveau Family

On the first question, we used a ranking scale with 1 being uncertain and despondent, and 5 being excited and hopeful. 25/43 responses were a 5, and additional responses can be seen below:



For the second question, 69.8% of respondents said Yes!, they want to be part of the new community. 30.2% said not sure, and no one answered No.

The responses to questions 3 and 4 were varied, and we'll do our best to address as many of those as possible in future bulletin and Spirit articles.

With this positive affirmation from the community, we're moving ahead into Phase 2 of our transition: New Community Formation/Creation Planning. This new phase will take us into the beginning of next year, and actions in this phase may include:

- Creation of mission statement, vision and values using the identified needs of the community/what we need and want QAC to be in the future
- Naming the community
- Organizing the "formal" structure of the new community
- Creating operating procedures for the new community
- Identifying meeting space based on current/future needs of the community

Our immediate next steps are for Matt and Meghann to meet with the director of Marianist Lay Communities – North America (MLC-NA), with the Society of Mary Province, and Fr. Tom to share the direction we plan to take and gather their feedback. We're also starting to meet with some people outside of our community, those who are wounded or wandering, like we've shared at previous meetings.

Then, it will be time to start forming some committees to build our next season, together!

If there is work in which you'd specifically like to participate, please let us know! And please remember that all energy levels, gifts, and contributions are important for this new season. Some of you have expressed you're too tired to build something new. That's okay – and we believe you still have gifts and ideas to share in this process! We can trust each other to discern what we can give and where we need to rest.

Please join us in praying about our next steps and how each of us may help build the new season of our community of love!

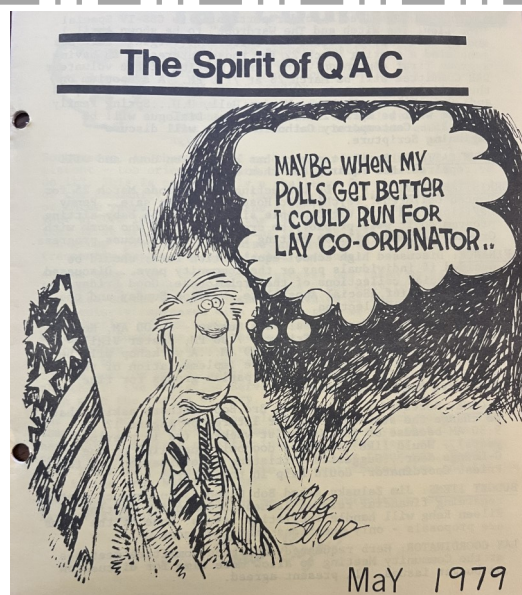
## Religious Education News...

## SOCIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY

**Family Promise of Greene County** - One of the areas that Social Justice Ministry addresses is homelessness. The lack of affordable housing is one of the largest issues facing families these days. In 600 counties across the United States, at least 50 percent of renters have spent more than half their household income on housing, according to the National Association of Counties. The sudden loss of income or unexpected catastrophic incidents such as natural disaster, costly hospitalization bills or physical disability can cause homelessness. Although Social Justice Ministry is not involved in direct advocacy for preventing homelessness, it has been involved in supporting agencies throughout the Greene and Montgomery Counties that serve displaced individuals and families. One such agency that QAC has been involved is Family Promise of Greene County, formerly Interfaith Hospitality Network/Schneider House of Hope. Social Justice Ministry allocates \$100.00 a month to Family Promise and provides meals through its Cooking Ministry Teams.

**New focus of Family Promise of Greene County** - Family Promise of Greene County, OH (FPGC) recently won a national Family Promise Clayton Prevention grant to help families who are in danger of losing their housing. The agency is initiating a prevention program to help struggling families keep their homes or stay in their rental homes. The program targets families who are falling through the cracks of currently available programs. Family Promise now has funds to assist families with bills, like back rent or utilities, to help prevent them from being evicted. There are also funds to assist with housing deposits and moving costs if these are necessary to keep a family housed. To be successful in preventing family homelessness, Family Promise will work with a host of partners including local social service agencies, landlords, eviction court personnel, and donors. The grant funders ask the agency to raise \$10,000 funds locally from the Greene County community to show the local support for homeless prevention programs. How can you help? **About this Cooking Ministry:** This cooking ministry started in 2012. QAC's Cooking Ministry provides meals at the shelter four weeks a year, each team taking one day of the week. Usually each team is made up of two households and meal plans are coordinated among the teams and are prepared at their homes and delivered to the shelter cooked ready to serve. This ministry provides an opportunity to serve and interact with those who have fallen on hard times. ### ***ECO-TIP from Social Justice:***

Toilet paper! Toilet paper! You probably thought you had heard the last of toilet paper crises now that the pandemic seems to be waning...Sorry... Wrong! However, this toilet paper crisis has nothing to do with supply chain issues. It has everything to do with sustainability and climate change. Trees are essential to reducing climate change, but the Canadian boreal forests are being clear cut to provide Charmin toilet paper, Bounty paper towels and similar products. While Proctor & Gamble is hardly the only company cutting virgin forests, it is perhaps the greatest offender to the point that shareholders and 88 descendants of the original founders have protested the environmental damage and shame to the founders' legacy. These forests also contain areas sacred to indigenous peoples and key habitat. Such ecological disregard runs counter to the message of Pope Francis in *Laudato Si*.

The Natural Resources Defense Council's 2022 Sustainability Report gives an A+ to Green Forest (widely available), Trader Joe's 100% Recycled Bath Tissue, and 365 100% Recycled Bath Tissue (Whole Foods). Seventh Generation is rated an A and is also widely available. Bamboo toilet paper is also highly sustainable, but harder to find in local stores.

Go sustainable. Please don't flush the forests!

## Beaver Creek Wetlands Association (BCWA)

Since 1988, BCWA has worked to protect and restore the Beaver Creek wetlands corridor that encompasses more than 2,400 acres. In addition to restoring and protecting the wetlands corridor, we work to educate the public to the importance of wetlands to our community.

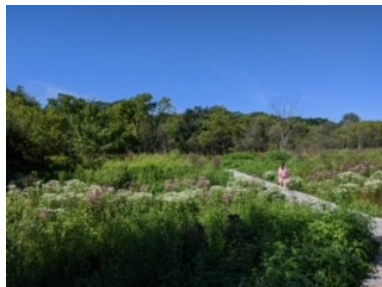
Wetlands are endangered ecosystems. Since the 1700's, 90% of Ohio's wetlands have been eliminated. When preserved, wetlands naturally filter sediment and toxins from water as it soaks into the underground aquifer, the source of drinking water in this region.

In addition to helping safeguard our drinking water, wetlands:

- provide habitats for hundreds of species of plants and animals



- provide opportunities to be in nature



The Beaver Creek Wetlands Association has a plan to make this regional asset more accessible to the public by creating an interconnected walking trail system called the Spotted Turtle Trail. This is an ambitious plan with many challenges, but we are off to a strong start due to the able leadership of our own Ken Moran.

The Social Justice Committee invites you to learn more about wetlands and BCWA's Spotted Turtle Trail by joining us for a short educational program following liturgy on November 13 in Si Lounge.

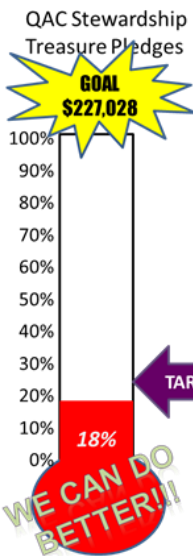

## Notes From Nature on the New Season

Walking the grounds of Mt. St. John and the trails of parks, the words of Joyce Rupp and Pope Francis come to mind. Rupp talks of three “r’s” – relinquishment, resilience, and regeneration.\* Pope Francis writes of the “Covids” in our lives – those painful personal “stoppages” and crises that are moments ripe for change.\* And I think about what these words and the surrounding autumnal nature can teach about Queen of Apostles approaching a New Season.

The trees relinquish their leaves and the seedpods empty. Branches stretch and twine upwards against the azure sky, resilient though their trunks have holes and slices of loss. As those vivid leaves of yellow and crimson and a palette of greens float downwards, they melt back into the soil, laying the ground for the regeneration of other seeds, and new life to emerge in another season. I wonder what tiny marvels will sprout and grow. The prickly thistle illustrates how even something painful can yield beauty.

Will we mirror God’s cycles of surrender, resilience, and growth in our own New Season? “What is the greatest fruit of a personal Covid?” asks Pope Francis. “I’d say patience, sprinkled with a healthy sense of humor, which allows us to endure and make space for change to happen.”

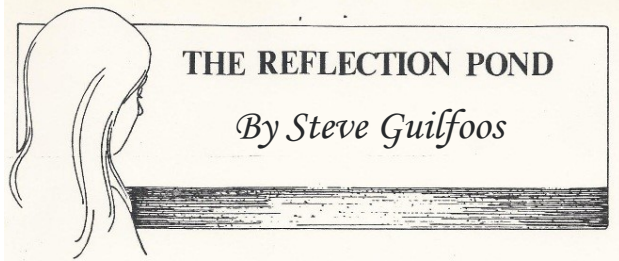

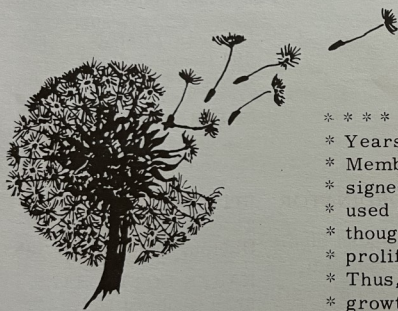

## Priest Coordinator

The summer is drawing to a close, and we are all awaiting, in one way or another, the coming of the Fall season. In so many lives at this time of year, there is the spirit of preparation. Our common endeavor is a work of grace and human effort. We profess our faith in Him and in His vision; we seek ways to make our faith come alive in our daily lives. For all the efforts that have been expended, God blesses us. For what yet needs to be done, He is our strength and courage.

Fr. Gene Contadino served as Priest Coordinator at QAC from 1977-1983, and then joined together as part of a rotating team of priests with Fr. Tom, Fr. Don Cahill, S.M. and Fr. Chris Conlon, S.M. from 2006-2010. Today, he serves as the Spiritual Director for the Marianist Mission and blesses us by presiding at Mass when he is able to.
