## COMMUNITY PROJECT: RESPITE BAGS FOR HOMELESS NEIGHBORS

We have a wonderful opportunity in May to collect items to fill **50 RESPITE BAGS** for the homeless who visit Corpus Christi parish for evening meals, support, and prayers. Respite bags are given to the homeless in the evenings and are paper bags filled with snacks and other items to help sustain them until they can get their next meal somewhere. This program was started and is supported by the Food for the Journey Project, and bags are given out all year round, thanks in large part to our Marianist Brothers and many Lay Marianist communities.

We at QAC have a date in June to bring our bags to Corpus Christi parish, so our collection of needed items will be during May, with **sign ups on May 7 and 14, and collection of items on May 7, 14 and 21** in the **chapel vestibule**. We will fill all the bags during our Community meeting on May 21. Thank you for your generosity during this Easter season to serve others as Christ did!

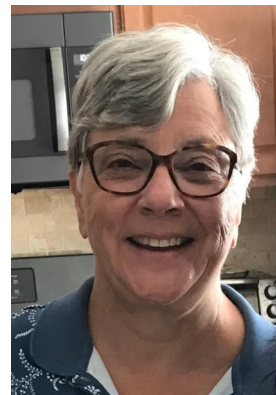

### ***ECO-TIP from Social Justice:***

**Eat your leftovers!!!**

The New York Times recently printed an article on how central Ohio is reducing its food waste with the aid of environmentally-conscious school children and an environmental consulting firm. Household food waste accounts for almost 40% of food waste and food waste rotting in landfills produce methane, a greenhouse gas more potent than carbon dioxide. That same article said that "food waste is responsible for twice as much greenhouse gas emissions as commercial aviation."

Suggestions from Liliana Sierra, a Laudato Si advocate in Cincinnati, and Susan Shain, the NY Times reporter, include "plan your meals and love your leftovers", shop with a list, freeze what leftovers you can't eat, buy less in the groceries and order less in restaurants, recognize "use by" and "sell by" dates are merely suggestions and don't necessarily indicate food is unusable, and learn to use those remaining ingredients from recipes in salads and smoothies and soups and stock. To quote Pope Francis, "*Throwing away food is like stealing from the table of those who are poor and hungry.*"

## Stewardship in Time of Transition



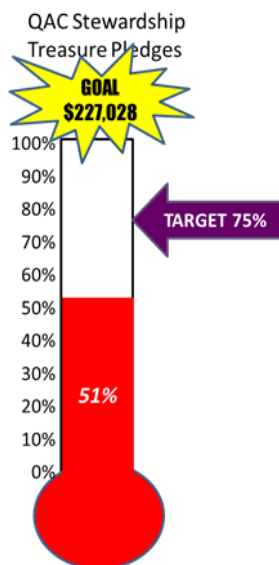

## LABYRINTH OF MOUNT SAINT JOHN AND THE MARIANIST DAY OF ENCOUNTER



The Marianist Encounters Day of Action is a day of service between the first of April (month of Earth Day) and the end of May (the anniversary of Pope Francis' environmental encyclical *Laudato Si*), dedicated to answering Pope Francis' call to hear the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor.

On Saturday, May 13, Queen of Apostles will partner with the Marianist Environmental Education Center (MEEC) to work on the native plant labyrinth in MSJ's front field. The labyrinth requires a couple of carefully timed cuttings each year to keep the plants compact while not interfering with flowering or pollination. No intensive back-straining work - like digging or hauling of soil - will be required. Meet in the MEEC Resource Room at St. Joseph Hall at 1:00PM. Bring your own gloves if you wish or borrow a pair from MEEC. MEEC will also provide all necessary tools and instructions. Bring a reusable water bottle, wear long pants and closed-toe shoes. A water-filling station and light snacks will be provided. Timing is flexible if you need to arrive later or leave before the work is completed.

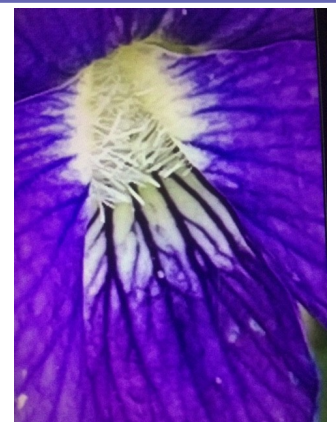
The labyrinth is a popular prayer fixture at MSJ, an important teaching tool about native plants, and a source of seeds for MEEC's nurseries each fall. The labyrinth is modeled after the 1000 year old labyrinth inlaid in the floor of the Chartres Cathedral. Walking a labyrinth is designed to be a spiritual experience. One way of walking is described in the *Sacred Path Companion* as the four Rs: Remembering, Releasing, Receiving, and Resolving – remembering you are blessed, releasing negativity and letting go, receiving guidance and peace, and rebirthing and redirecting. Richard Rohr states that "...the turning circuits of a labyrinth remind us that life is change and transformation..." - an idea deeply relevant to QAC as our community winds our way into our New Season. Sr. Leanne Jablonski, MEEC Director, will offer a guided labyrinth walk at the conclusion of the afternoon for anyone who is interested.



At MEEC's wonderful Springtime Inspiration retreat, Program Director Tara Poling thanked QAC for its long support of MEEC and asked all participants to pray for our QAC community as we transition from a parish to a Lay Marianist community. We hope many of you will take this opportunity to partner with MEEC for a couple hours on the day before Mother's Day to work, learn, and pray with other Marianists as we honor Mary, our Mother, and care for our Mother Earth. Roses and lilies are most commonly associated with Mary, but the violet is honored as symbolic of her humility and simplicity. Playing around with my iPhone camera and reveling in the first violets of spring, I was stunned when I looked into this macro photo of a violet. No matter how I looked at it – right side up, upside down, sideways – it felt as though God had painted a mystical masterpiece in the heart of this tiny wildflower, often considered a weed. What thoughts and memories flow forth for you as you gaze at it? What feelings arise in your soul? How does this mystical "flower painting" speak of what Mary means to you? Hail, Mary, full of grace!

This information is provided just below the Seniors Corner Article on my boards. Ruby and I made our annual anniversary Red Bud tour a week early. It was a good time, especially having an ice cream cone on the way home!

The major activity for May is the collection of the summer schedule for concerts and festivals in the Miami Valley. **Be sure to bring lawn chairs to all festivities, except RiverScape.** The major parks are:

- **Beavercreek Lofino Park:** Generally good, but only one hour – easy in and out. Ruby and I go most Sunday evenings.
- **Beavercreek The Greene:** Good line up of **Saturday** "Summer Block Parties". I will divide them into Family and Adult where a "Beer Garden" is available. Park in the south parking garage. Go through the tunnel and go to the left. Set up on the walk way overlooking the stage.
- **Centerville Stubbs Park:** Very good! It starts early June through August. The lower paved main lot is all handicapped parking. Go to this lot drop, off your passengers and go to the north grass parking lot. They open the rear gate after the concert. Check a map on how to get through the plat easily.
- **Dayton RiverScape Park:** Good line up of entertainment. If you cannot find street parking, go to Second Street Market for parking on Second Street or in back. I generally put my bike on the back of the car. I never miss the Celtic Festival - July 28, 29, 30.
- **Dayton Levitt Pavilion:** Excellent line up, generally 48 concerts (**Thur, Fri, Sat**) for 16 weeks. Details of the performances are on the internet. Bing/Google Levitt Pavilion Dayton. Free street parking is generally difficult.
- **Kettering The Frazee:** Full line up of entertainment, 35+ events, including ~4 Free Festivals and ~4 - \$5 concerts (Free and Nearly Free).
- **Kettering Civic Band at Polen Farm, 5099 Bigger Rd:** Three Thursday night concerts at 7:00PM. This is a great mid week break.
- **Miamisburg Riverfront Park; 3 N. Main Ave:** Concerts start early June through August. Some outstanding groups.
- **Springfield Summer Arts Festival:** Six weeks (**Thur through Sun**) of entertainment starts mid June. Very good and diversified.

When I get the information together I will provide an active link to each.

## Update from the Murnanes...Constitution Day

You might not be at fault if you don't know that the United States celebrates Constitution Day annually on September 17. Not a lot of attention seems to be paid to this observance. Though it's very different from the observance here in the Republic of the Marshall Islands on May 1 annually! Here, Constitution Day is a significant national holiday. It marks the anniversary of the country's new constitution and independence. Parades, field day activities for schools, sports tournaments, pageants, and other competitions are held to commemorate the day. The Marshallese people use this day to commemorate their homeland and culture. The Marshall Islands and the United States of America also commemorate their historic relationship, which lasted after the Islands gained independence from America.



I watched a couple of YouTube videos on previous years' parades, and it reminded me of Fourth of July parades when I was a child. Led by a police color guard with the nation's flag followed in short order by a marching band; a local girl's drill/dance team; and each of several schools had representatives marching under their school's banner. What surprised me was a banner accompanied by K and K (grocery store) employees, but

Payless had employees right behind them and I even saw a couple of people representing EZ Price. The utilities each had a group marching. I probably have not done justice to all of the churches, companies and organizations that marched, but I want to add one more – the people with children and baby strollers who didn't have any banner, but walked along having a good time enjoying a celebration.



Following the parade, there is a stage that is populated into the night with choirs from various churches, singers and dancers representing the various cultures which are represented here, and, to be honest, I don't know what all else. But there will be speeches! We won't understand much of what is said, but Linda and I are likely to be there to hear some anyway.

As a part of the May 1 Constitution Day celebrations, Linda will serve as one of three members of the judiciary judging arguments presented by high school students in a moot court competition. The arguments will take place on April 28 and prizes to the winning team(s) and orators will be presented as part of the celebrations.

Civic education is as important in the U.S. as it is in the Republic of the Marshall Islands. In the U.S., May 1 is "Law Day", and around the U.S. judges and lawyers will also be reaching out to reinforce the importance of the Rule of Law. In the U.S. this year, the Law Day theme on May 1, 2023 is ""Cornerstones of Democracy: Civics, Civility, and Collaboration." Something for all of us to think about as we consider the value of our freedom.

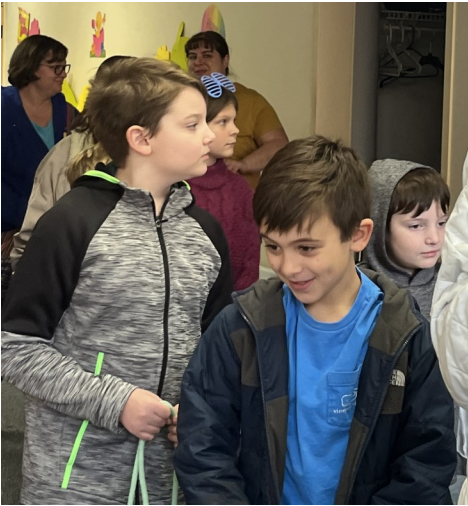
