## A New Season Update

On Sunday, May 21, Matt Naveau provided an update at the Community Meeting that was held in the Madeline Room located in the Chaminade Center. What a beautiful facility!! If you were not able to attend, the meeting was recorded and has been posted to the New Season website page [http://qac-ohio.org/?page\\_id=5403](http://qac-ohio.org/?page_id=5403). Meghann showed those in attendance how to access the New Season's home page, and all that is included on this site. All community members have access to this site using their dedicated login. If you need your login information, be sure to send an email to [qacnewseason@gmail.com](mailto:qacnewseason@gmail.com).

A few highlights from the meeting included an update on each of the three existing task force groups: 1) *Education and Formation*, which held their first meeting a week prior to the community meeting and will begin to look at the various types of formation we might be able to offer for adults and children. 2) *New Gatherings*, which also met for the first time a week prior to the community meeting and is looking at what will we be doing during our gatherings since we won't be coming together for weekly Mass any longer; and 3) *Facilities* – this group has been looking at facilities that we might be able to use in our new season. There is a set list of criteria that they are using to determine if a facility would meet our needs, such as: would the space be dedicated to our new community use; the number of rooms available, the amenities that might be available to use, the location, etc. The group has already looked at a few facilities – St. Leonard's in Centerville, Mount Saint John (Madeline Room), LifePointe Church in Kettering, Mosaic Church in Beavercreek, and Bethel Christian in Beavercreek. Each task force will present a summary of their findings and a recommendation for the community to review.

As we continue to work together to build our new season, we want to thank all those who have been involved with the first three task force groups – Facilities, New Gatherings, and Education and Formation. While these groups are still gathering information, we look forward to sharing more updates by the next community meeting.

We are pleased to present the next three task force groups that we will need volunteers for - *Community Branding*, *Social Justice*, and *Intercommunity Partnerships*. Information for each of these task force groups is included on the next page. Volunteer signups will be held on Sundays, June 4 and June 11 immediately following our Mass. We pray that you will find time in your schedule to volunteer for one of these groups. Dates and times of when each group will meet will be decided by the group's availability. If you would like to volunteer but will not be at Mass on either of those Sundays, send an email to the New Season committee at [qacnewseason@gmail.com](mailto:qacnewseason@gmail.com), and include your contact information and the task force that you are volunteering for.

In closing, we want to remind everyone that with the closure of QAC as a parish, our new community will not provide access to sacraments, religious education, nor a weekly Mass. In our new season, we will become a Marianist Lay Community that will embark on a new journey of faith, one that will build on our missionary call that sends us out to meet, serve and "be church" with others.

## Next Three Task Force Groups

### **Community Branding**

Create the name and visual look (logo and other branding materials) for our new community; develop written mission, vision and values that reflect our community's focus on radical hospitality and social justice. This group will also work to create brand guidelines and other materials as needed in support of the creation of the new community.

### **Social Justice**

Develop recommendations for the themes, partners, and methods through which our new community will pursue and live social justice; recommendations should include frequency of activities, community participation goals/expectations, and any staffing/organizing needs that would benefit the new community.

- Possible themes: Climate justice, poverty, anti-racism, etc. Possible partners: Change and Be Changed, Family Promise, Catholic Relief Services (CRS), Catholic Social Services of Miami Valley (CSSMV), etc.
- Possible methods: advocacy, education, events, fundraisers, service, etc. Consider how Social Justice can be integrated beyond “just” a committee doing all of the work and planning all of the events (for example, set an expectation that everyone chooses a theme to be a part of (like a club for climate change, a club for hunger/poverty, a club for human rights, etc.)).

### **Intercommunity Partnerships**

Develop guidelines and recommendations for community and parish partnerships that our new community may explore and want to prioritize; this group may overlap some with social justice work, but also includes faith-related partnerships (i.e. St. Leonard's Faith Community, local parishes, etc.).

## THE DAYTON PEACE MUSEUM AND OUR “MAN OF PEACE”

*“Learn the past. Change the future.”*

*“There is no them, there is only us. We promote a world that seek alternatives to war and violence and encourages compassion”*

The words above are taken from the website of the Dayton International Peace Museum. The Peace Museum was founded in 2003, spearheaded by Christine and Ralph Dull, seeking to promote peace, not just as an absence of war but as a “positive peace”, with political, social, economic, and environmental justice for all. The intention was to move from a culture of violence to a culture of peace. Dayton was seen as a perfect location for such a museum, having been the site of the historic Dayton Peace Accords. The original museum was in an historic house on Monument, but during the pandemic, the Peace Museum staff and board decided to make lemonade from lemons, moving into an accessible, extensively renovated site on Courthouse Square. Permanent exhibits on Gandhi, social justice-inspired art, a children’s “Just Peace” room, the Dayton Peace Accords and Peace Prize, and digital exhibits on Peacebuilders share the space with special exhibits, social justice presentations/gatherings, musical performances, and even yoga sessions. It is a place that can only be fully appreciated in person. Light streaming through the wall of windows and the beauty of the fabric “peace-chain” hand-painted by community members looping across the ceiling, lend an air of inner peace and even joy to the sometimes dark facets of the exhibits.

On May 18, a group of QAC members were privileged to receive a docent tour of the current special exhibit entitled *(Dis)Information: Propaganda, Conspiracy Theories, and the Power of Protests*, utilizing fascinating historical documents - old war posters, advertising, printed material, movie posters, and television. It was fascinating to examine how even a TV comedy can be geared to shape a particular message.

Bill Meers, who had arranged this tour, has been a volunteer with the Dayton International Peace Museum since 2004, almost a founding member. He created a database for volunteers and donors, and has been their data manager ever since. Bill



has been referred to in some of their posts as “the legendary Bill Meers, our longest-serving volunteer”. Bill also has curated past special exhibits on Gandhi and on gun culture. A sampling of Bill’s contributions to peace and justice include a presentation at QAC on racism, along with Kelly Bohrer hosting untold international visitors along with Mary Lou Meers, spearheading participation in the Good Friday Walk for Justice and Peace, studying and visiting other religions and places of worship to better understand and appreciate their culture and beliefs, and the list goes on. One of the posts on the Peace Museum website stated that Bill started marching with Martin Luther King in 1964, has been a member of NAACP for over 50 years, and has marched every year to mark MLK Day. If Bill were not a man of peace, he may kill me for this article. When we first showed him the bulletin announcement for his tour of the Peace Museum, he asked us to remove the reference to him as “Our Man of Peace”, stating that there are many others in

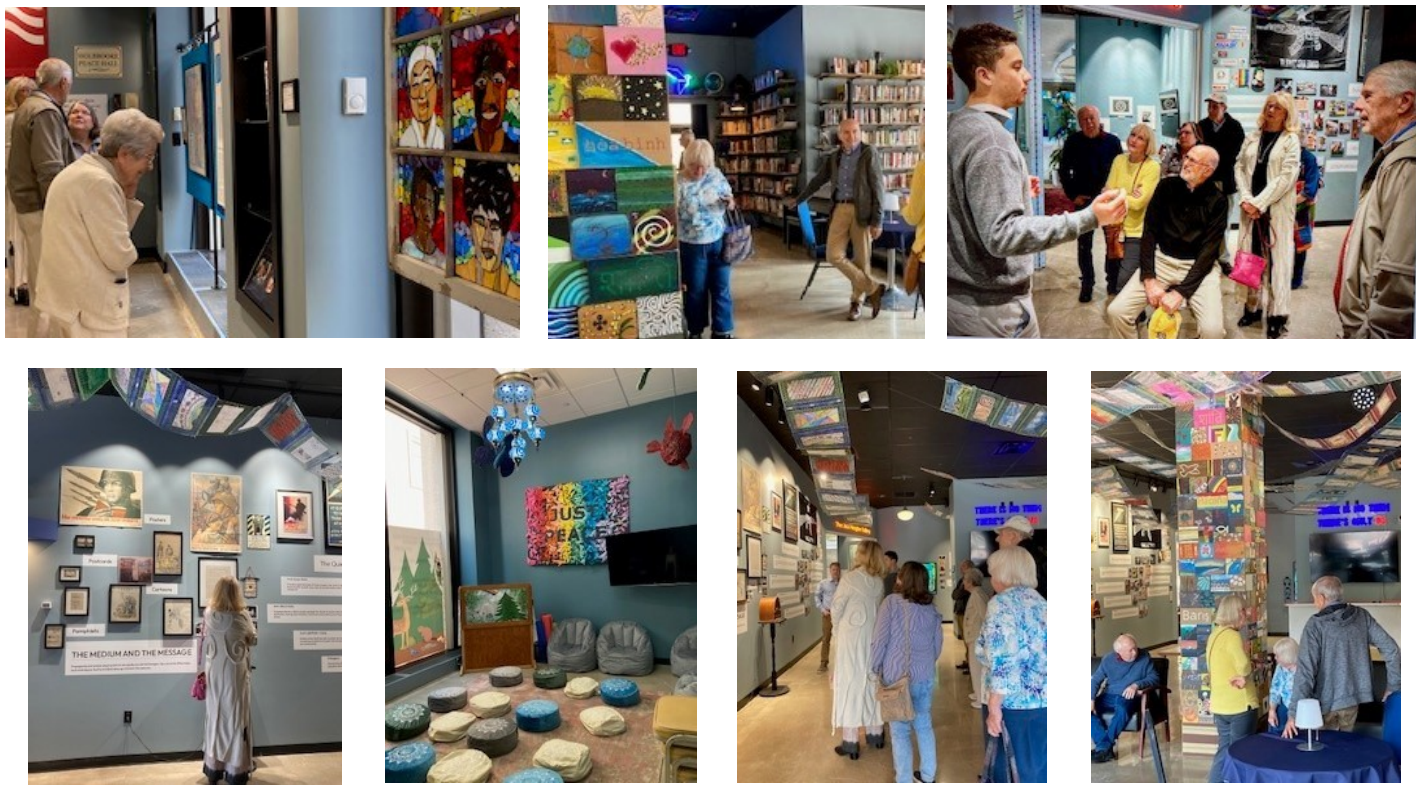


our QAC community who are also strong advocates for peace and justice, and he should not be singled out. During

our tour on the 18<sup>th</sup>, we were told that Bill protested the plan of the Peace Museum to add a feature on him in their Peacebuilder Stories digital exhibit. They overruled his modest and humble objections. Consequently, Bill Meers will soon be taking his place among other honored local “Peacebuilders” like Sr. Dorothy Stang. While Bill may not have given his life for peace and justice like Sr. Dorothy Stang, he has devoted his life to the promotion of peace and justice. To quote Bill, “Let’s keep marching and inspiring each other so we can create a more Peaceful World.”



### ***ECO-TIP from Social Justice:***

How does your garden grow? Pass up buying new plastic hanging baskets and either reuse old ones or, better yet, switch to more environmentally friendly ones, like metal frames with coconut liners. Similarly, pass up new plastic containers of any type. Reuse what you have, grow from seed in the ground or in compostable seed boxes, plant in terra cotta pots, recycle when possible... anything to reduce plastic! Consider using native plants for gardens. MEEC’s Native Plant sale is coming up June 24 and is a great resource, plus it helps their mission and fundraising. Avoid pesticides and commercial weedkillers – we need our bees and butterflies and especially as QAC-ers, we can appreciate the dandelions that dot our “native meadows!”

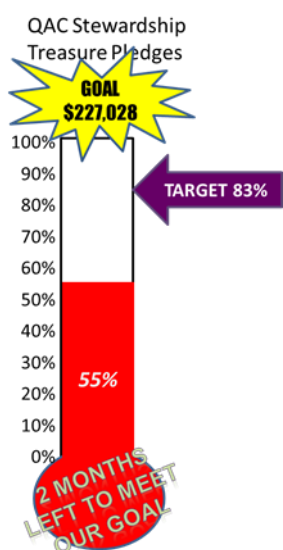

My May quest is complete or nearly complete. I have collected 10 parks and venues with regard to the summer Miami Valley Concert and Festival events, and have provided an internet link for each. I have also provided links to OhioFestival.Net (<https://ohiofestivals.net/ohio-festivals/>), Miami Valley Bike Trails and maps (<https://www.miamivalleytrails.org/trail-map>), and Miami Valley Water and River Trails and maps (<https://www.mcdwater.org/river-fun/river-trails/>).

The "Miami Conservancy District" (MCD) has mapped, developed and manages the Great Miami, Stillwater and Mad Rivers for recreational purposes. The State of Ohio has done the same for the Little Miami along with many other Ohio rivers. The Little Miami is a state park south from Spring Valley, just south of Xenia, to the Ohio River. It is an Ohio Scenic River North to John Bryant State Park. The Little Miami State Park is TUNNELS of GREEN in early summer and then turns to TUNNELS of GOLD in the fall. Easy access to the Little Miami River or bike trail is available at Spring Valley (also several locations south) just east of Oh 42 at CR725. It is an impressive sight looking up on the I-71 bridge over the Little Miami. We are starting a great summer in the Miami Valley.

Special activities, as usual, will be highlighted in the monthly Seniors Corner. June has two noteworthy weekend festivals in Miami County. Check the boards in the vestibule, RiverScape, The Greene and Levitt, for other Saturday activities.

### AFTERNOON WITH MARIANIST ARTISTS SATURDAY JUNE 10, 2:00-4:00PM

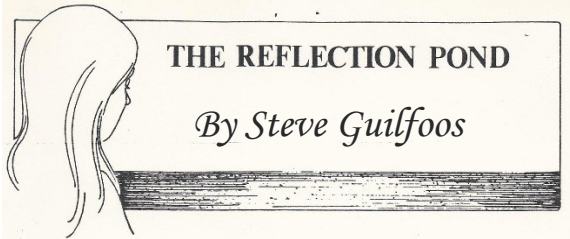


